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Comparative Religions Brainstorming Sheet Hinduism and Christianity

In today's world of mass media, it doesn't matter if you consider yourself a religious person, the topic of religion is on the news almost every day. The topics of abortion, prayers in school, fundamentalists and the "right wing" political machine all creep onto our evening news. Globally, we hear about the Sunnis and Shiites fighting, jihads and the on-going conflict between Palestine and Israel. But what do we really know about these religions and what they truly teach?
